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Dear

I wrote to you in welcoming you to our canals and rivers as a continuous cruiser and explained how we would be monitoring your movements to make sure that they were sufficient to comply with the rules.

This is to let you know that we are somewhat concerned to see that we have seen you only in the to area and this suggests that you are not making the type of journey required to qualify as a continuous cruiser. The legislation covering your licence says that it is your responsibility to demonstrate to us that you are 'bona fide navigating', not remaining continuously in any one place for more than 14 days'. One way of satisfying us is to keep a log and share this with us. The way to do this is to send this to me, by email if you can, each month.

We hope that over the coming weeks you will be able to satisfy us that your movements are in line with the requirements. If you think this will be difficult, do please try to obtain a home mooring. There is information to help you at <http://canalrivertrust.org.uk/boating/mooring/finding-a-home-mooring>. If there is a particular reason you've been unable to move as much as you planned to do when taking out your licence, do please share this with us as we may be able to make a temporary exception to the mooring rules. You can read more about this in our [mooring guidance](#).

As mentioned in my last letter, by the time we come to send you your licence renewal form, if we don't see you genuinely navigating, we will need evidence that you have secured a home mooring where you can keep and use the boat in the area where you need to stay. This I'm afraid could leave you with the stark choice of moving away from the area and adopting a genuine continuous cruiser lifestyle, or moving off our canals or rivers. I do hope that we won't get to that position.
